Each year in March, men, women, and dogs from around the world converge on the state of Alaska to take part in what has become known as the "Last Great Race" on earth. This race is known as the Iditarod, a Trail Sled Dog Race. The terrain is beautiful and brutal, the sled dogs are nothing short of majestic.

Take your students on an extraordinary reading journey in conjunction with the amazing journey of mushers and sled dog teams known as the IDITAROD. Follow the Iditarod Trail Race from Anchorage Alaska to Nome Alaska. Kids love dogs and adventures, so this race is set up perfectly to allow students to follow each step of the race, while reaching their reading goals as they watch the iditarod participants reach their racing goals.

Reading Goal Suggestions:
